Also being planned is a Fall Tour. While final details are still being hammered out, be sure and Save the Date on your calendars: October 20 - 21.

Annual Meeting Report

Vicki Zeiger passed on the minutes from the annual meeting in Branson. It seems like the challenges that face the regions are the same. Several regions are doing some things we already do - active recruiting of new members at area concours and shows with a booth that offers information and sign-up options. It is having some success.

Congratulations to Carrol Jensen, CCCA's new president who was recently profiled in Hemmings. Carrol addressed the challenges of attracting new and younger members. "There was a period of time when people had the concern that old people drove old cars and young people drove muscle cars, as if there were a one-to-one correlation," she said. However, she said the club has already seen an increase in membership among people in their 40s and 50s, some of whom have no experience in a Full Classic automobile. "We're seeing that demographic with disposable income and time on their hands, maybe from the kids moving out, getting engaged as new members," she said. It's that

demographic, – and not even younger enthusiasts in their 20s and 30s – that the club should spend its time, effort, and money pursuing. "We want to start with just the love of cars in general, anything with four wheels," she said.

Touring with the cars helps build awareness and dispel the notion that the cars all sit unused in trailers, garages, or museums. One other notion Jensen said she's working to dispel is that Full Classics all cost tremendous amounts of money. While some do reach into the six- and seven-figure brackets, she said some can cost as little as \$30,000. "There are good quality, good-running affordable Classic cars out there, and there's not nearly enough emphasis on them," she said. "Particularly not when some people think nothing of spending \$50,000 or \$60,000 on a bass boat or a brand-new pickup truck."

San Filippo - Place de la Musique



The stunning Grand Foyer. An elaborate nickelodeon dominates the landing.


Although not technically a car related event, the trip to San Filippo was undoubtedly one of this year's highlights and one that club members who attended will be talking about for quite some time.

From the foyer, where chandeliers, stained glass panels, and music boxes surround you, to the actual 350 seat theatre, with it's posh balcony overlooking more chandeliers and an 80 rank theatre pipe organ, everything is absolutely stunning.

Before jukeboxes and radios, there were nickelodeons and orchestrions, mechanical machines that played the music of the day to entertain the public in restaurants, bars, dance halls, and fairgrounds. These automated machines with their elaborate, artistic facades had the ability to replicate sounds of a small group of musicians up to a full orchestra. The Sanfilippo Collection has on display the largest variety of these restored instruments in the world.

Originally the home of the SanFilippo family, some of the home has been converted into this museum and part of it remains a private residence. The museum is a labor of love and almost everything here plays music.

A second building houses a number of restored working steam engines dated from 1820 up through the 1920s including a recently restored and reassembled complete power plant from an East Chelmsford, MA factory consisting of the slate switchboard, Corliss steam engine, shaft-coupled AC generator, DC exciter generator, overhead crane, and steam condenser. There are eight operating steam engines in the lower level of the main house and over twenty in the Carousel Building, including the one that originally

operated the 1890 French Salon Carousel.

Additionally, there is an 1881 Grant Steam Locomotive with restored caboose and 1890's Pullman passenger car. There are six vintage street clocks around the estate and a newly restored tower clock with an ornate 33' tower.

Undoubtedly, the jewel of The Sanfilippo Collection is the Eden Palais, built in 1890, the most complete example of a European Salon Carousel in existence. It's carved, lit-up facade (at right) measures 89' wide by 42' tall. A fifteen-year restoration effort has brought this majestic Carousel back to its glory. Thirty-six horses, several gondolas, chariots, and a spinning tub turn to the sounds of a Gavioli Band Organ. Undoubtedly the highlight of the day was the opportunity for all to ride this lovely carousel.

We will be at the **BLACKWELL NORTH** shelter





HOT TIP

When removing mold from a car's interior you have to make sure you do not damage the fabric or other surfaces. Do NOT use bleach, ammonia, or other chemicals. First, vaccuum, then use a damp sponge and a small amount of a mild detergent to wipe away any remaining mold. Vinegar is an excellent cleaning agent, and can get rid of the musty odor from mold. Spray with a solution of three parts warm water and one part white vinegar. Gently brush mold off fabrics with a scrub brush. Use a scrubbing sponge on hard surfaces.

Wear a mask to protect yourself from those mold spores!


Oakbrook





Worldwide Auctioneers to sell Hostetler Hudson Museum collection

On January 30 the Hudson Automobile Museum Board voted to permanently close the facility and liquidate its 55-vehicle collection. The auction will take place on Saturday, August 4, 2018. Worldwide Auctioneers will handle the sale of the museum's holdings, in an auction to be held at the facility's former home in the Shipshewana Town Center.

Hostetler's Hudson Museum was founded by marque enthusiast Eldon Hostetler, an inventor with a lifelong passion for Hudson automobiles. To stay busy during his retirement, Hostetler began collecting Hudsons, Terraplanes, Essexes, Railtons and Dovers, eventually purchasing eight acres of land in Shipshewana, Indiana, near his boyhood home, with the intent of constructing a museum dedicated to his cars. He made an agreement with the town to donate his collection of vehicles, along with the vacant land, if the town agreed to build a museum to house them. A stipulation of the deal with Shipshewana required the museum to remain open as long as both Eldon and his wife Esta were alive. Eldon died in January 2016, while Esta lived until May 2017. A committee was formed to save the museum by finding ways to fund its ongoing operation but could not devise a plan to close the gap between revenue and operating expenses, and with no clear path forward, the vote was taken to close the museum and sell its assets.

Per the IRS and the common law of trusts, three general rules apply: 1 - Full and fair value must be paid for the assets conveyed, meaning they can't be discounted for a quick sale or offered to another party at below-market value. 2

- The proceeds must be applied to proper charitable purposes, meaning the revenue generated from the sale must be used for the public good by Shipshewana. 3 - Private individuals must not receive improper private benefits, meaning that no person associated with the Shipshewana Car Museum, Inc. can benefit from the sale.

The Hostetler collection includes a wide variety of American cars and trucks, including an example of the very first Hudson automobile, a 1909 Model 20, along with one from the final production year, a 1956 Hornet sedan. a coachbuilt Murphy-bodied 1928 Town Car, and the 1917 Shaw Special, a Hudson-powered race car built atop a Duesenberg frame. Also on the block will be a 1937 Terraplane Pick Up Express, and a 1931 Series U "Greater Hudson" seven-passenger touring car.

The replacement program was initiated because certain fire extinguishers can become clogged or require excessive force to activate, posing a risk of failure to discharge. In addition, the nozzle can detach with enough force to pose an impact hazard. The product recall involves two styles of Kidde disposable fire extinguishers: plastic handle fire extinguishers and plastic push-button fire extinguishers. 
