



Salvage Yard Auction



In 1945 Oliver Jordan of Enid, OK bought and opened a salvage yard. After some issues with the local authorities, in 1953 Jordan closed the yard, put up barbed wire and rarely let anyone in.

Jordan died in 2003 and his wife passed on last fall. His heirs, who have previously tried to sell it are now taking it to auction. Piece by piece.

The full inventory of vehicles is still being compiled, but now numbers around 250 lots, the great majority of them from the prewar years. Perhaps the most unusual offering will be a 1939 Lincoln seven-passenger sedan with all-aluminum bodywork. Also going on

the block is Jordan's personal supercharged 1937 Cord sedan, plus a seldom-seen 1917 Maxwell, a 1936 Ford truck allegedly equipped for hauling moonshine and a selection of tractors.

There's plenty of time to reserve your spot. The auction is scheduled for June 7, 2014 at 9:30 a.m.

Scholarly Research of the Automobile

The Revs Institute for Automotive Research, Inc., is an educational organization that advances the scholarly study of automotive history at The Collier Collection in Naples, Florida. Numbering more than one million items, these distinctive and highly specialized research books, documents and images are collected to record the history of the automobile and the individuals and organizations associated with it.

The Collier Automotive Museum was among the finest automotive museums in America and perhaps one of the top 10 such museums in the world when it closed its doors more than 20 years ago. It has reinvented itself as the automotive research-focused 'The Revs Institute' and beginning in late March will once again open it's doors to the public through advance reservations and limited group sizes.

Though details are still not complete, they expect to have approximately 100 vehicles on display.

Access is by application and appointment only.





Ultimate Find




Although Porsche officials decline to reveal how or where it has been, they recently put on display the first car ever designed by founder Ferdinand Porsche, at the age of 22. Nicknamed the P1 for "Porsche, number one", the vehicle has been locked away untouched for the past 112 years.

Although it doesn't look like more than a horseless buggy, when it hit the roads of Austria in 1898 it was a technological feat.

Powered by a 3-hp electric motor in the rear driving a 12-speed control unit, the 2,977-lb. P1 could reach 21 mph. The lead acid batteries weighed 1,103 pounds and provided sufficient charge for a range of approximately 49 miles, though not at top speed. The braking system consisted of both a mechanical and an electric component, and both its body, which could be easily altered from coupe to open-top style, and electric motor rode on suspension systems designed to protect against the primitive roads that motorists of 1898 encountered. After its first drive on June 26, 1898, Porsche continued developing the car, and in September 1899 won a 24-mile electric-car race with three passengers, finishing 18 minutes ahead of the next challenger.

Although the body no longer exists, translucent panels represent what the original would have looked like. Given it's historical significance, Porsche has no plans for further restoration and the vehicle now resides in the Porsche Museum in Stuttgart, Germany.



New National Register

Similar to the National Register of Historic Places, cars can now be placed on a National Historic Vehicle Register.

A collaboration began in March, 2013 between the Historic Vehicle Association and the U.S Department of the Interior's Heritage Documentation Program developed four criteria for individual vehicles to be added to the register.

Criterion A: Associative Value - Event

A vehicle associated with an event or events that are important in automotive or American history.

- •1903 Packard "Old Pacific" early transcontinental traveler
- •1953 Ferrari 375 MM President's Cup winner Andrews AFB race

Criterion B: Associative Value – Person

A vehicle associated with the lives of significant persons in automotive or American history.

- •1932 Duesenberg SJ Fred Duesenberg's personal car
- •1909 White Steam Car first US Presidential auto

Criterion C: Design or Construction Value

A vehicle that is distinctive based on design, engineering, craftsmanship or aesthetic value.

- •1948 Tucker (design/engineering)
- •1925 Doble (engineering steam)

Criterion D: Informational Value

A vehicle of a particular type that was the first or last produced, has an element of rarity as a survivor of its type, or is among the most well-preserved or thoughtfully restored surviving examples.

- 1953 Corvette EX122 (prototype)
- 1899 Packard (first Packard built)

All of these criteria should be considered on national, state and local levels.

First vehicle on the Register? A 1964 Shelby Cobra Daytona Coupe (CSX2287) which met all four criteria "Having my Shelby Cobra Daytona Coupe design recognized as the very first car to be included in the permanent archives of the Library of Congress is a great honor and the thrill of a lifetime," said Peter Brock, Brock Racing Enterprises and the designer of the car. Over the first year or so the HVA plans to add at least another 10 vehicles to the NHVR and in the coming years plans to add hundreds, if not thousands, and to open up the nomination process to the general public. While only individual vehicles and not entire makes or models of vehicles will be eligible for inclusion in the register, any make or model will be considered.

How Does CCCA Define a Classic?

The Classic Car Club of America defines a Classic as a "Fine" or "Distinctive" automobile, American or foreign built, produced between 1925 and 1948. Generally, a Classic was high-priced when new and was built in limited quantities. Other factors, including engine displacement, Full page custom coachwork and luxury accessories, such as power 1/2 page brakes, power clutch, and "one-shot" or automatic lubrication systems, help determine whether a car is considered to be a Classic.


