Editor's Corner





She was moved to ortho neuro unit this afternoon because her vitals are good. However, she needs lots of encouragement to get inspired. Nursing staff, visitors and I are all trying to get her to accomplish deep breathing plus hand and foot movement. No timetable.

Reuben has four cracked ribs, a broken sternum, (is that a naval term I missed?), a damaged psyche, and a sore body. Was discharged Mon nite Feb 19. Plans to resume work and driving this week.

Reuben is extraordinarily grateful that his dog Lucky wasn't along.

"These are very special memories in my life and my Mother named Jessie Mae, who was their oldest Granddaughter, after Nannie (Jessie) Nash" said Mr. Wheary. The children were mentioned in articles and photographed on their grandparents laps at the Motors, taking rides in Nash Cars, and even going to the proving grounds.

Mr. Wheary is a seasoned executive who has been active in business for more than 50 years. He is currently Capital Campaign Executive Director and Major Gifts Chairman, and also Professional Services Advisor for Racine Heritage Museum – Racine, WI; Senior Consultant to Kenosha History Center – Kenosha, WI, and also consults with other 501(c) 3 and Non-Profit organizations. He is a Member of the Nash Car Club of America and Contributing Writer for The Nash Times – Worldwide. Most recently he's the Producer & Presenter of the Nash Power Point Slide Show Presentation entitled The History of Charles W. Nash & Nash Motors "The Greatest Rags to Riches Story in American Automobile History."



Nash Motors



C.W. Nash

Charles W. Nash was born to a poor farming family in Cortland, IL on what is now Rt 38 - Lincoln Highway. His parents separated when he was 6 and he worked as a farmhand in Michigan as an indentured servant that was to last until he was 21. He had only three months of schooling per year while he was "bound out" to perform farm chores. At age 12, Nash ran away and became a farmhand in Michigan where he learned carpentry. After his marriage to Jessie Halleck they moved to Flint, Michigan, and in 1890 Nash was hired by William C. Durant of the Flint Road Cart Company, which later became the Durant-Dort Carriage Company.

Durant hired Nash for \$1 per day as an upholstery stuffer. Within six months, he was promoted to superintendent of the factory and within 10 years became vice president and general manager. Nash introduced the straight-line belt conveyor into the assembly of carriages. By 1910, the chief business of Durant-Dort was building automobile bodies for the Buick unit of General Motors.

W.C. Durant, president of the new General Motors Corporation found himself short of both capital and skilled management and brought Nash to Buick to oversee production. Nash became vice-president of Buick in December 1910. In late 1912, Durant was fired by General Motors and Nash became the corporation's president. Within

three years, Nash had restored GM organizationally and financially due to his strategies of getting rid of unprofitable products, streamlining manufacturing and consolidating small production units into larger ones. He also set up an International sales and export division in New York City. Nash was forced out of GM in 1915 by Durant, who had again taken over the corporation.

Vowing neverhttp://bortzautocollectionroom/e, in 1916 he purchased the Thomas B. Jeffery Company in Kenosha, WI and renamed it Nash Motors. Jeffery's best-known automobile was the Rambler whose mass production from the Kenosha plant had begun in 1902.



Nash Special Cabriolet Designed by Count Alexis de Sakhnoffsky. 20 of them were built, but only 11 were sold.

The 1917 Nash Model 671(nc) was the first vehicle produced to bear the name of the new company's founder.

In 1924 Nash absorbed LaFayette Motors and converted its plant to produce Ajax(nc) automobiles, a car of exceptional quality for its price. Sales however, were disappointing. Changing the car's name to "Nash Light Six"(nc)

in June, 1926 sales improved. In an unusual move, Nash Motors offered all Ajax owners a kit to "convert" their Ajax into a Nash Light Six. Supplied at no charge, the kit included a set of new hubcaps, radiator badge, and all other parts necessary to change the identity of an Ajax to that of a Nash Light Six. Done to protect Ajax owners from the inevitable drop in resale value when the Ajax marque was discontinued, most Ajax owners took advantage of this move. "Unconverted" Ajax cars are quite rare.

In 1937, Nash Motors merged with Kelvinator, a leading maker of refrigerators, to become Nash-Kelvinator. During WWII, Nash-Kelvinator temporarily stopped producing automobiles and consumer goods, expanding instead with military contracts for aircraft engines, propellers, and other materials.

Charles W. Nash retired in 1945 to California where he died in 1948 at the age of 84.
