

Speaking of local specialties... I have my list. Cheese curds and fudge, New Glarus



Historic Road Trips

As road trips go, our imminent Fall Tour is small. But it got me thinking about road trips in general. Hagerty just put out a story on the Abernathy boys - Louis, known as Bud, age 9, and Temple, age 6, who drove a Brush Runabout automobile from New York City to their hometown of Frederick, Oklahoma. With the blessing of their father. No surprise, since in 1909 he sent his two sons, by themselves, riding their two horses to Santa Fe, New Mexico and back to Oklahoma.

Brush was one of the main competitors to Henry Ford's Model T. The boys purchased a Model D runabout for \$485 from a New York dealer. Temple's legs were too short to reach the pedals, so Bud would end up doing the driving, but Temple had the important (and dangerous) responsibility of crank-starting the Brush.

Louis and Temple arrived in Oklahoma City 23 days after they left New York City, greeted by a



throng of well-wishers. The odometer on the Brush read 2512.2 miles. That's an average of over 100 miles a day—pretty impressive when you consider what roads were like in 1910.

Bertha Benz of course has long been credited with making the very first road trip in an automobile. In 1888, Bertha decided to demonstrate just how powerful the vehicle was, taking it on a 60-mile journey over the German countryside to see her mother, taking her two teenage sons along for the ride. Being a resourceful woman, Bertha invented solutions to every problem she encountered; she had a shoemaker add leather to the braking blocks, thereby inventing brake pads, used her hatpin to unclog a fuel line and her garter to insulate a wire. She successfully reached her destination in fewer than 12 hours no doubt doing more for the name Benz and the automobile in general, than any amount of advertising.

In the spring of 1904, Dr. Horatio Nelson Jackson set off for what would become the first cross-country U.S. road trip. Jackson, a restless doctor eager for a challenge, made a \$50 bet in a San Francisco club room that he could drive an automobile farther than one had ever been. He departed San Francisco in a 20-horsepower Winton touring car for New York—an endeavor that took 63 days, countless repairs, and a good deal of money.

With the help of a former bicycle mechanic, Sewall Crocker, and a stray dog (whom he outfitted with driving goggles), Jackson set out on his adventure. Jackson and Crocker broke down for the first time just 15 miles after

departing. They repaired countless blown out tires and at one point had to be rescued from quicksand by a horse.

As for the bet, Jackson never did collect that \$50.

Just six years after Jackson's historic trip across the U.S., Alice Ramsey, a 22-year-old New Jersey native, became the first woman to complete the journey by automobile. Ramsey's trip was sponsored by the Maxwell-Briscoe Company, a popular automaker at the time.

She was Accompanied by her two older sisters-in-law and a teenaged friend, none of whom knew how to drive. The journey took 59 days and covered 3,800 miles. The highest speed they reached was 42 miles per hour—a speed they described as "terrific."

I suggest that you put this show on your calendar for next year.



In addition to the cars, there were displays, music, and food trucks. The weather cleared and the sun was out by noon.














The 50th Anniversary of the Packards of Chicagoland celebration was a two day event (September 21st & 22nd).



Kim Roberts and her daughter Maggie made it out to Auburn this year. Always a fun event, they spent time at the parade, the street dance and the auction.


Maggie and Kim are pictured here with Tony Ficco. No word yet on whether or not Kim succumbed to the auctioneer's spiel or if she was able to resist.

Pebble Beach



Automobile Air Conditioning: part two

Henney introduced air conditioning for its ambulances in the late 1930s, beating the rest of the industry by a mile. So we thought this item, from Niagara Packards, would be appropriate for this publication.

My car's manual says to roll down the windows to let out all the hot air before turning on the A/C. WHY???

As soon as you enter the car open the windows and then after a couple of minutes turn ON the A/C. According to research, the cars dashboard, seats, A/C ducts, in fact, ALL of the plastic objects in your vehicle emit BENZINE, a cancer-causing toxin - a big carcinogen. The "acceptable" benzene level indoors is 50 mg per sq. ft. A car parked indoors with windows closed will contain 400-800 mg. of benzene - eight times the acceptable level. If parked outdoors in the sun, at a temp above 60 degrees the benzene level goes up to 2000-4000 mg - 40 times the acceptable level. People who get into the car, keeping the windows closed, will eventually inhale excessive amounts of the benzene toxin.

Take the time to observe the smell of heated plastic in your car when you open it and BEFORE you start it up. In addition to causing cancer, benzene poisons your bones, causes anemia and reduces white blood cells. Prolonged exposure can cause leukemia and increases the risk of some cancers. It can also affect your kidneys and liver; what's worse, it is extremely difficult for your body to expel this toxic stuff.

So please open the windows and doors of your car and give it some time for the interior to air out and dispel the deadly stuff before you enter the vehicle

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
