

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

On behalf of the club, I wish to extend our collective deepest sympathy to Mike, Kathe, and Tom on there loss. We appreciate the many memories Jim has left us with



Our condolences go out to Lucille and the entire Manak family at this sad time.



Another entertaining afternoon has been planned for you.


Dennis Heywood has graciously allowed us access to his outstanding collection of award winning automobiles.

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
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Fall Tour

August Day Tour

"GIRCCCA Members Join AACA Members on One-Day Barrington Area Tour" By Charles F. Falk

Greater Illinois Region, CCCA member, Dan Sobczyk, who leads the Fox Valley Chapter of the Illinois Region of the AACA, recently arranged a one-day tour on August 5, 2023. GIRCCCA members were invited to join AACA on the tour. My wife, Joan and I were among those accepting the invitation. All fifty tour spaces were quickly claimed. The day began with a tour of Humberto Garcia's "MPG Auto Body Shop" in Algonquin. Apart from being very hospitable, Humberto has become well-known as a knowledgeable restorer of collectible Lincoln automobiles—especially those from the sixties and seventies. While consuming coffee and pastries, visitors to his resto shop had the chance to view some of his completed work, and works-in-progress.

From there, the group made a short drive through the countryside to Barrington Hills and the large and private Sanfilippo Estate, to see interesting collections that were the passion of the late Jasper Sanfilippo. The estate includes about 200 acres and Mrs. Sanfilippo, all five of her children and their families live on the grounds. The collections include mechanical musical instruments, steam powered devices, art objects, scent containers, and other memorabilia. The estate is not open to the public, but over the years, the family has opened it up to charitable organizations and offer access to the estate as a fund-raising event through the Sanfilippo Foundation.org. which they founded. Since the family started this practice, more than twenty-million dollars have flowed to charities from tickets sold to supporters wanting to visit the estate.

The Sanfilippo family came into wealth and prominence as the founders (in Chicago) of John B. Sanfilippo & Son, Inc. The firm is probably most well-known for its Fisher Nut Company products, but it offers varied products under others of its family of brand names. Its corporate home is now in Elgin, IL, but has several other facilities in the U.S. and abroad. In 2022, the company celebrated its "Centennial."

Soon after arrival at the entrance to the estate's main building, our group was introduced to the Director of the Foundation, who indicated that he would take the visitors through. What we were about to experience was a curious mix of art, aesthetics, technology, history, and culture.

Joan and I had been to the estate twice before and knew a return visit would allow us to see things we may have missed previously; but we were more interested in seeing a brand-new and recently opened "Perfume Passage" exhibit. It aims to "...preserve the history, beauty, and artistry of perfume bottles, compacts, ephemera, and related vanity items" ...and "seeks to educate and inspire visitors by illuminating the connection between perfume and the human experience." I thought it would be difficult to fashion an interesting exhibit for this type of collectible; but that challenge has been creatively met by showing objects in vintage perfumeries and in a vintage barbershop setting.

However, it is the extensive array of mechanical musical instruments and devices, along with all manner of steam driven equipment, that most commands visitors' attention. Two "showstoppers" in the musical instrument category are the wonderfully restored Wurlitzer theater-style pipe organ, and the enormous, elaborate French-made "Eden Palais Carousel," that are on display. The 1927 organ - which was played to offer our group a mini-concert - was magnificent and is said to be the largest of its type that still survives in the world.

The Eden "Salon" Carousel was built in 1890 and is a true marvel that showcases all manner of faux animals moving around and keeping up with the beat of the music. Happily, we were able to ride the carousel and experience its magic firsthand. While this exhibit is the real head turner, there are several other, smaller, but very interesting and clever machines to charm visitors.

As far as the steam driven devices are concerned, the 1881 steam-driven Grant Locomotive and Tender and related passenger cars are hard to beat. The train can and sometimes does, leave its building on special occasions. Visitors will find interest in the many steam driven devices that have kept all kinds of important processes operating for manufacturers and consumers during the last 150 or more years.

Whether considering the mechanical musical instruments, the stream driven devices, or the art and other objects, tour visitors couldn't help but notice how many cultural and technical advances or changes have occurred in the last 150 or more years. In all, the Sanfilippo provides a wonderful, educational, and entertaining experience.

The Classic Car Club of America defines a Full Classic as a "Fine" or "Distinctive" automobile. American or foreign built, produced only between 1915 and 1948. Many factors come into play but, generally, a Classic was a high-priced, top end vehicle when new and was built in limited quantities. No "Mass produced" assembly line vehicles are considered Classics. Other factors, including higher engine displacement, custom bespoke coachwork and luxury accessories. Mechanical developments such as power brakes, power clutch, and "one-shot" or automatic lubrication systems, help determine whether a car is considered to be a Classic.

Only certain models of some vehicles built during 1915 through 1948 are recognized as CCCA Classics: Be sure to check the list of recognized cars to see if all models of a particular marque are accepted as Full Classic cars. Application may be made for Full Classic consideration by applying to the National CCCA Classification committee.
